IDE PARISH COUNCIL

Council Tax – Village Precept:

The precept is the amount of money the Parish Council receives from Teignbridge District Council to cover the “running costs” of the village. We have to put in a claim for this allocation every year and I confirm that the Parish Council have asked for no increase to last year’s precept figure in the calculation of Council Tax bills for 2014/15.

Ide Village Fund – There is funding available from Parish Council reserves for voluntary organisations within the village to apply for if it is shown to be for the benefit of the community. Any applications received will be considered at the bi-monthly Parish Council meetings.

Street Lighting: Devon County Council have now switched off most of the street lights in the village between 12.30 a.m. and 5.30 a.m. as part of their programme to reduce carbon emissions and energy costs throughout the county.

Winter weather – Thank you for your efforts to keep the drains and gulleys clear. The Parish Lengthsmen did come in December but the excessive rain caused silt and debris to build up after they had been.

The stock of sandbags has been replenished after the heavy demand over the New Year. Sandbags and bags of road salt are available from the metal storage container in the Car Park – to arrange collection, please contact Roy Melhuish, 7 Cross View Terrace (Tel: 01392 252360) or Barry Hookins (see below).

Please don't take grit from the bins at the side of the road for use at home.

Potholes – The huge pothole on the mini-roundabout has been reported to Devon Highways for repair. If you wish to report a problem with the state of the roads please go to http://www.devon.gov.uk/road_maintenance.htm and complete the relevant section or bring it to our attention.

Yes, Ide has superfast broadband (Infinity) at last. BT finally got cracking and the necessary work was completed before Christmas. Some people already have fibre optic broadband installed.

Fast broadband will make a significant difference to both domestic and business users in the village. In my case the download speed has increased from 1.7mb to 75mb. For the many people who download huge files, images or videos this will make life a great deal easier.

I would like to thank everyone who signed the petition calling on BT to prioritise Ide. It worked: we had been scheduled to get connected this summer. We could not have achieved this without considerable help from our representatives starting with Rose Saunders and Ide Parish Council. 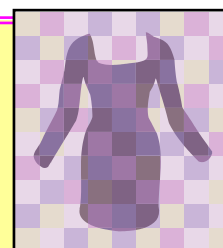

SHOPPING IN IDE IN THE 1940'S

We enjoy the space and carefully displayed goods in our Community Shop, and it is in sharp contrast to those shops we had in Ide during the war years.

There was not the income or articles to buy then and also we had rationing. The three grocery shops cum general stores were very cosy affairs. Most of us could only afford to get basic necessities. At Christmas exciting articles did come on show and once we even bought a tiny train set. That was from Mrs Saunders at 48 High Street, where the shop was just one room. The Post Office was just one room too, and this was a general store and haberdashery too.

Across the road was Mrs Glanville's shop, which was rather dark and cavernous, so all the goods seemed mysterious. With limited income and rationing I wonder how these shops kept going.

We could also buy freshly picked vegetables and free range eggs from Mr Medland and also Jackmans - a small-holding opposite the school. The hens were so free range that sometimes there was a squashed one on the road! Jackmans also sold paraffin.

Going on down past the Huntsman we had our baker, Coxes, and I remember they sold farthing buns in batches of four. Their delivery van also served the locals.

Also delivered was the milk. Great horses pulled the cart, or so they seemed to us small children. The milk was poured into our own jugs.

Opposite the bakers was the butchers, Mr Burnett, with his wife who was the cashier sitting in a tiny kiosk inside the shop. I was awed by the meat cleaver and massive chopping block, including blood stains. This was rationing time, so a serious business. In earlier times the slaughtering was done in the back. (My late husband wrote about this in an Ide Times a number of years ago.)

So we had all our needs in the village, but they were quite modest. It was a case of checking what was needed and then whether there was the cash to buy it beforehand.

As a child I liked the way the bell rang when I entered a shop. The proprietor was often busy with her own home life but would come from her living-room because I had made the bell ring!

All of this has gone now - swept away by time - but we are blessed with our village shop run by so many friendly people and always a pleasure to patronise.

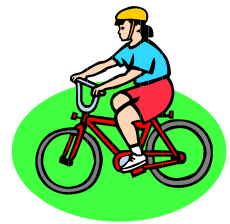
Registration opens at the Poachers at 12 for a 1pm children's race and a 2.30pm adult race.

IDE MEMORIAL HALL

The Hall Management Committee decided at its meeting at the end of November that it would prefer to try and raise the £120,000 needed to improve the hall rather than the much larger sum required to demolish the hall and start again. A sub-committee are now contacting grant making trusts and hoping that local organisations will have fundraising events. The Art Group are planning an exhibition and Ide Aloud are planning an event. Devon County Council and Teignbridge have been able to provide some funding for which we are most grateful. We hope it won't be too long before we have a village hall we can be proud of.

WEST TOWN FARM & ORGANICARTS

After a very wet and windy start to January we're now all back to work and ready to kick off 2014, or at least splash through it!

As new years are about changes we're using this one to re-jig the dates of our Meat Week. No longer will it fall on the third weekend of every month but, from February, will move to the first weekend of every month, meaning next Meat Week will start on Thursday, January 30th when the shop will be open 9am-5pm until Monday the 3rd of February.

We will be increasing the cost of our boxes ever so slightly; the "Just for Me" box will now be £29, the "Original Meat Box" is now £41 and the "Family Box" will be £82. We really hate to do this but throughout last year our butchery and packing costs increased. On the plus side we have nosily looked about at everyone else's prices and we're 99.9% sure we're the least expensive, local, organic meat option.

Our other new year's resolution is to run more adult activities on the farm to really make the most of our produce, including the farm's non-cultivated offerings such as wild garlic and blackberries. So we've put together a selection of courses - some may not be appropriate for the talented cooks of Ide, some may help cultivate that talent! The general idea is a day out on the farm, including a nice lunch, enjoy a guided walk - which may possibly involve picking up some foods on route - and learn to make something delicious.

This month the first of our courses take places on Saturday the 1st February, making Medlar syrup and chutney, and then a day of Basic Butchery and Charcuterie on Sunday the 2nd February. Hopefully we'll see you there!
