





The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Wednesday 16 May 2018 at 7.30pm, followed by the Annual Meeting of Ide Parish Council and then followed by the next ordinary meeting of Ide Parish Council in the Memorial Hall, Ide. If you have an issue you would like the council to discuss, please contact the chairman or another parish councillor. Requests for items to be considered for inclusion on the agenda should be made at least 14 days before the date of the meeting. The first ten minutes of a Parish Council meeting are open to the public to raise possible items for future meetings; or to comment on items on the agenda for that meeting.

Neighbourhood Plan. The submission version of the Neighbourhood Plan has completed the statutory time frame for comments. An independent examiner has been selected and will begin the review process shortly. A copy of the submission version is available on the Ide Village website and hard copies are available in the Community Shop, the Huntsman Inn, The Poachers, St Ida's Church and Ide Congregational Church.

Pynes Community Orchard: The Parish Council held an extraordinary meeting on 18 April to authorise the Chairmen of the Working Group and the Parish Council to meet in London on May 10 with the Church Commissioners to take forward the matters relating to sale of the orchard, after the Commissioners accepted the Council's most recent offer to buy the orchard. A prospectus will be published shortly explaining the history of the orchard, the benefits for the village of acquiring it, and how we plan to raise the money. Minutes of the Community Orchard Working Group meeting held on 12 April 2018 are available on the village website.

Weir Meadow Playing Field. We have also agreed a price for the purchase of Weir Meadow from the Church Commissioners. Once the issue of agricultural access to the fields to the north of the Meadow has been resolved, the Parish Council, with the help of its Weir Meadow Working Group, will be in a position to start fund raising in earnest for this project as well.

These two projects have become possible because of the Neighbourhood Plan. You wait for a century for land to become available for the village, and then two fields come along at once. Ide has a once in a lifetime opportunity to buy land close to the village for community use – sport, recreation, open public space and the preservation and restoration of an ancient Devon orchard as local green space. The projects complement each other; and will attract funds from different grant giving bodies. The Parish Council is equally committed to and passionate about Weir Meadow and Pines Orchard. Each piece of ground different features, a different characters, and presents different challenges. And each will fulfil different, valuable functions. The fund raisers on each working group are ready to go, and confident of raising the money.

17/02835/FUL- Sculpher Photography, Fore Street – demolition of existing industrial building and erection of a dwelling. **Awaiting decision**

18/00010/FUL 28 High Street. Ide - two storey side/rear extension. The overall decision was not to support the application because it was felt that it would affect the visual amenity of the neighbouring property. The increase from 3 to 4 bedrooms could also increase car ownership and impact on an already heavily congested **Permission refused**





IDE MEMORIAL HALL

It doesn't seem two minutes since we wrote last month's report but a lot has happened at the Memorial Hall since then. The stage was removed quite quickly and as anticipated the hall space now seems very much larger than the resulting 20% increase in effective floor area. The floor in the stage area has been concreted to bring the level up to the rest of the hall. A ceiling has been created in the stage area and the bare brick walls have been dry-lined and insulated. The ceilings throughout the hall have been replaced and fully insulated. The central heating boiler has been replaced and an impressive length of new electric cabling has been installed to support the new lighting and power arrangements (you might now know that the hall has been operating for years with only two double power sockets). Finally a new porch has been built so that we will have inner doors to keep out the draughts. The porch was also needed to carry the light switches so that hall users will no longer have to find their way across the hall and onto the stage before trying to guess which switch operates which light!!

We are immensely grateful to Viridor, who confirmed a second grant of £18k at the end of March. We are still operating on a very tight budget as the scale of work we have undertaken is quite substantial. Our appeal to local businesses for additional funds has been somewhat disappointing but we live in hope. Any offer of funding, however small, would be very gratefully received at this point in time to help the development team sleep at night!

The plan is to have the hall fully operational, if not totally completed, in time for Ide Aloud's birthday party on the 11th and 12th May. We hope everyone will be impressed with the new look hall and will be encouraged to support us to complete the project with a new floor, storage cupboards and new fittings and furnishing to match the standard of the refurbished building.

Camel Herders, Polders, and Ide Community Shop.

Another long cycle trip last summer. Another grateful nod to Ide shop. A ride from the North to the South of France, with a route that was going to be edited live, on a daily basis. St Malo to Avignon via the mountains of the Massif Centrale. From undulating to unspeakable. Clearly a serious energy source was a priority. Was it Brenda, or Barry who outlined to me the possible benefits of a caloric surplus to build muscle? On our departure the only luggage items on my front rack were two one kilo bags of dried dates from Ide shop. A few to be transferred daily to a bum bag strapped to the handlebars. Just as the camel herders of the trans Saharan caravans reckoned 4 or 5 dates a day gave them the energy to trudge on, so a handful helped on the major 5 to 10 kilometre climbs in the Cevennes and the Ardeche. Especially in the 40 degree heat of last June's heat wave. And thanks must be given to Imogen who long ago insisted that such food items were an essential energy source for the people of Ide.

The previous year I had sought advice from an expert on Holland, Elizabeth, of the Post Office counter. We discussed, between parcel post options, spread over several shop visits, the best route to cycle from Amsterdam to Copenhagen. The pros and cons of the North Sea coastal route via Harlingen and Bremerhaven: great beaches and open vistas but head winds and dodgy weather. Against riding a North East diagonal through Holland to Bremen and Hamburg: reclaimed polder lands and exciting long distance off road forest tracks but then the flat farming country of Northern Germany with its identical 'Stepford' towns and villages. The latter was her final choice, resulting in arrival in Hamburg in one week, and Copenhagen just two.

And this summer? Having spent time with routes and maps trying to decide what constitutes a road trip, I'll discuss it with the shop.

All around me I see marriages breaking down, friendships turning sour, depression and anxiety ruling people's lives. And it breaks my heart to see people accept this as 'normal'. People like to cover up their pain and pretend it isn't there, even if just for a few hours in the pub. People, even friends of mine, even Christian friends of mine, accept brokenness and pain in their own lives. On the outside, all is well, but I see their pain. I see their struggling and I wish there was something I could do.

Maybe in Ide we're not struggling with poverty or homelessness, but perhaps it is with broken relationships and depression? Money hides a lot of pain but even the richest people in the world have admitted that they aren't happy.

But what can I do about it? What can the church do about it?

Well, **I can pray**. To a God who created the world, who loves us so much that he gave up his life for me, for my friends and the people I see around me. A God who is so desperate to be with us and fix our problems. So, I do pray for them, each of them, often. Miracles can happen.

And **I can love**. God's kind of love for people, regardless of race, faith, sex, or background. It is unconditional. It is selfless. It is all that 1 Corinthians 13 talks about. It is being available. It is not judgemental. It doesn't expect anything in return.

I can offer hope. Hope of restored relationships, hope of forgiveness, hope of a future, of peace, joy and love. It's what Jesus offered when he came to us and died for us and rose from the dead.

But I mess up. Yes, and that's exactly why I need a saviour. I'm not perfect. Christians aren't perfect. We are just people who have acknowledged that we need help. Fortunately, God's love for us isn't based on what we do. It is based on who we are! I am his child!

And what I have as his child, is what Jesus promises to everyone who asks: **a peace that is beyond understanding and a joy that isn't based on our circumstances. And I have hope.** That one day I will stand at the gates of heaven and Jesus will say to me: Welcome, good and faithful servant. Come and live with me in your eternal home.

So, can I encourage you to pray, to love and to remember how much you are loved!

Getting the Message Across

"Then you should say what you mean," the March Hare went on.

"I do," Alice hastily replied; "at least—at least I mean what I say—that's the same thing, you know."

"Not the same thing a bit!" said the Hatter. "Why, you might just as well say that 'I see what I eat' is the same thing as 'I eat what I see'!"

"You might just as well say," added the March Hare, "that 'I like what I get' is the same thing as 'I get what I like'!"

"You might just as well say," added the Dormouse, which seemed to be talking in his sleep, "that 'I breathe when I sleep' is the same thing as 'I sleep when I breathe'!"

As a church, we are in the business of communicating. Of getting the message across. We serve a God whose mission is to make his love known to all people, to touch and change lives, to reshape our existence so that it dances in time to the music of heaven rather than to the rhythms of the lesser gods which surround us. But how difficult it is. Lewis Carroll hit the bull's eye with the zany conversation between Alice and her teatime companions. Good communication is so complex that we describe it as an art more often than as a science.



Wouldn't life be simple if communication wasn't such a mystery! We're told to "Say it with flowers". That "A picture is worth a thousand words". That we need to <u>read</u> people's body language. That the medium is the message. Yet it's an art we are still far from mastering. In the world of politics we hear of "gunboat diplomacy" and "megaphone diplomacy." And it was Aristotle, apparently, 2500 years ago, who came up with the oft-quoted guide for public speakers. (It's good advice for preachers too...)

"Tell 'em what you're going to say.

Tell 'em it.

And tell 'em what you have said".

All these ideas jostled round my mind as I listened to the unfolding drama of Cambridge Analytics, and Mark Zuckerberg testifying before Congress in the USA. Words fly round the world at ever greater speeds, in ever larger numbers. We have the tools to make communication more complete, easier to access and more open... yet Alice's problems are as big as ever. In the hands of the wrong people, words are weapons. They conceal more than they reveal and they are taken prisoner by those who would misuse them.

As Christians, we affirm that the Bible is God's written revelation to us. We speak of it as "The Word of the Lord". In the same breath we call Jesus "The word made flesh". And the writer to the Hebrews puts it this way...

"In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son."

He too is telling us that God's communication is more than just words. He makes himself known in the person of Jesus. Our challenge, as we read our Bibles, is not to settle for understanding the words, but to discern the person who is behind and even within them.

I do encourage people to come along to our "Reading the Bible" session on Saturday 5th May in St Michael's Church Alphington, from 10am to 12noon. We will just scratch the surface of what God is doing with his Bible. We may find we start a journey which leads to greater in depth exploration of God and his word.


Maybe too, we can think carefully about how we use (and misuse) this most precious gift which our Father has given us... the capacity to communicate.

JUBILEE CLUB

What a joy to feel sun on our backs, I feel certain the animal life are also enjoying the warmth. It was also a pleasure to hear the chatter as the club met after quite a break on Monday April 16th, and an interesting illustrated talk by Paul Rendell

about the filming of War Horse.

Much filming has been done over the years on Dartmoor and many years ago Paul came up from Plymouth to be an extra, earning £25 a day, food supplied, mess around all day maybe until 5.pm then 10 minutes filming. During the first world war there were estimated 30,000 ponies on the moor. At least 15,000 were rounded up and sent to the war, its estimated that only 3,000 came back.



For the filming of War Horse extras were paid £100 a day plus food. Michael Spielberg saw the stage show and was so impressed he wanted to make a film. Spielberg loved the Dartmoor scenery especially the wonderful sunsets, during filming they were blessed with good weather.

The farmhouse used for filming belonged to the M.O.D. plastic thatch was put on the roof and a plastic stable block built behind, the market scenes were filmed at Sheeps tor and Meavy, the locals complained and two days filming were scrapped. Castle Combe was then used, a popular venue for filming. Spielberg was often on set accompanied by two bodyguards. Eight horses were used to act as Joey requiring make up each day to make them alike. Paul Rendell was told by the bodyguards that he was not allowed to take photographs. However, Spielberg agreed so long as they were not publicized until after the film came out. The star playing the part of Albert had to learn to like horses and ended up loving them. The filming of Joey, ridden by Albert jumping a wall was taken from a helicopter. The Dartmoor National Park would not allow a field to be ploughed as a result much effort was taken covering a field with plastic and putting Bergenias to represent turnips! Rain had to be faked during the ploughing scene which took five hours to film, the actors were getting so wet twenty eight wet suits were sent up from Plymouth to put under their costumes. In order to get the horse to rear up it was tempted with food and the barbed wire was sugar craft.

Safe Routes for Ide

Safe Routes for Ide is a group of Ide residents who have become increasingly concerned about access to Exeter, walking cycling, and riding the local lanes especially Doctor's Walk, Balls Farm Lane and Little St John's Cross Hill. The road names alone conjure an image of quieter times when a passing car was a rarity. But now these narrow roads are full of traffic that seems to ignore the statutory access restrictions with impunity. The alternative of the main road access to Alphington via the roundabout, is especially unpleasant and a dangerous option for cyclists and pedestrians.

The group formed from the dormant Ide Wheelers and aims to improve safety for anyone not in a car, near Ide. We have been identifying the issues more closely and discussing the situation with authorities and concerned parties such as West Exe School. We hope to take this information forward to ensure motorists are using these lanes legally and with consideration for other users Our next meeting will be at The Poachers Inn, courtesy of Tony, at 7.30 pm. on Wednesday May 9th. If any of these issues concern you, please join us.



What do you do with lids, tops and caps? If you find yourself asking "Are they recyclable?", "Which bin do they go in?" and "Am I doing it right?" then read on.

These common questions now have a simple answer – YES! They are all recyclable! Simply give the bottle or jar a rinse, squash plastic bottles, put the top back on and recycle as you normally would – even if it's a metal lid on a glass jar.

Many people still remember the early days of recycling when plastic lids caused a problem due to being a different kind of plastic or being heavily dyed. Thankfully, technology has improved over the years and we no longer have this problem. Hurrah!

In fact, the recycling industry preference is now for lids to remain attached to bottles and jars. Lids and caps are small and light, so attaching them to larger items keeps them contained during the collection and sorting process and prevents them from jamming machinery. It also helps keep plastic bottles squashed, so reduces volume and creates more space in your recycling bin, bag or box and on the recycling collection vehicle. All in all, keeping your top on gets a big thumbs up all round and helps maintain Devon's 55.7% recycling rate.

(Keeping lids on plastic and glass bottles and jars is applicable to residents in Exeter, Mid Devon, North Devon, Torridge, South Hams, West Devon, Teignbridge and Torbay. East Devon residents can keep lids on plastic bottles and jars but must separate lids from glass jars)


