LOCAL COUNCIL ELECTIONS, including parish council elections, will be held on **Thursday 2nd May 2019**. Ide Parish Council meets in public six times a year, on the third Wednesday in January, March, May, July, September and November, from 7.30 to 9.00pm in the Memorial Hall. Anyone considering standing as a Parish Councillor is very welcome to contact the Chairman, Nick Bradley or the Clerk, Mel Liversage, by phone or email, to discuss what is involved and get an application pack.

Applications need to be submitted by 3 April 2019.

Pynes Community Orchard: We are expecting to sign the option to purchase agreement very soon. This will allow us to start fundraising. A prospectus is ready to go out as soon as this happens. The Orchard Working Group met on Wednesday 13 March 2019. The volunteer working party on 2 March 2019 was cancelled due to inclement weather, and the planned day on 6 April 2019 has been brought forward to **30 March 2019. Weir Meadow: The parish council, with landscape architect Pete Leaver, met with a Teignbridge DC planning officer to discuss the submission of a planning application for a cricket ground, football pitch, lit MUGA, playground, pavilion with changing rooms, and car parking on Weir Meadow. The land has been surveyed. We have also met on site with the Devon branch of the English Cricket Board for advice about lay out and funding.

Minutes of the Orchard and Weir Meadow working groups are available on the website.

Planning Applications

19/00039/FUL Springwell View, Old ide Lane, Use Of land as a domestic curtilage, construction of a detached garage and retention of hardstanding. The planning committee discussed the application, but were unable to support for the following reasons:-

- 1. It is on agricultural land, and contrary to TDC planning policy EN2a is on land defined as AGLV
- 2. It is outside the curtilage defined in the original planning application 17/0661/NPA
- 3. It is out of scale, being very extensive in size
- 4. The proposed development adjoins the "Ide Gateway Enhancement Area" and as such does not comply with Policy Ide07 of the now made Neighbourhood Plan for Ide. "Proposals for development within

the Ide Gateway Enhancement area (as identified on Map 6 in the Ide Neighbourhood Plan) will only be supported if they do not have an adverse impact on the rural character of the Village entrance or its approaches along the C50/Ide Village Road.

In the committee's view the alteration of AGLV land, which is currently in agricultural usage and as such is distinctly rural in character, would have an adverse impact on this character.

Update on previous applications

18/01024/MAJ Springwell Nursery IDE Erection of a new Garden Sales Area Building including Café/Restaurant, Storage/Warehouse, New Public Car Park Area and Turning Area. A decision was expected 21 December 2018 but the applicants have asked for an extension to allow for further reports.
17/02835/FUL Sculpher Photography, Fore Street - still awaiting flood report The next meeting of the Planning Committee is on Wednesday 15 May 2019 at 6pm unless otherwise advised. CARD PAYMENTS AND CASHBACK -

We all appreciate how easy it is to pay by card or with a phone app like Applepay but have you thought how much it is costing your shop? In 2018 we paid a whopping £865 in card fees. This is made up of the monthly rental for the card machine, a fee for every transaction and a percentage of the actual spend. We get charged every time! It is particularly



expensive if you take cashback, e.g. if you spend £5 and take cashback of £30, we are charged a percentage of the £35. So, please use the Post Office counter to withdraw cash. If the Post Office is closed we will try to help out, but cashback from the shop till is now limited to £30. We will, of course, continue to accept payment by card but would appreciate your help to cut costs and give extra business to your Post Office! Thank you.



CLIMATE EMERGENCY

The recent United Nations IPCC report on climate change has found that the difference between the impacts of global warming of 2°C and 1.5°C is much greater than previously thought, and with current policies in place we are heading for a catastrophic 3°C rise. The need to commit to ambitious reduction targets eg carbon neutral by 2030 is so clear even a school child can see it. In fact they do. The recent protests by school



children are an inspiration and are putting national governments to shame.

Ide Parish Council have now joined the swelling ranks of councils that have declared a Climate Emergency. This is a non binding but genuine commitment to work towards a specific measurable target. It might seem that a Parish Council can't really do much, but we can start by acknowledging the problem, and accepting that action is needed. Climate change is relevant to many of the council's activities, securing and developing green space in the village, working to improve public transport, providing feedback on wider council strategies eg Exeter's 10 year transport plan. It allows councils to treat climate change as a factor in future decision making. It could also be a route for getting funding and support with projects that work towards a carbon neutral community.

The urgency now is such that all levels of government, national, regional and local, have a duty to secure our community from climate breakdown. Local government such as Ide Parish Council cannot wait for national government to take the lead.

For the next parish council meeting in May, we want to identify actions the Council and community can take to achieve a measurable target. If you have ideas for things we can do locally, or if you would like to get involved or just tell us about things you are already doing, please contact us.

The REAL EASTER STORY (The Bible summarized)-

After being tempted by Satan in the Garden of Eden,

Adam and Eve 'broke' their perfect world. As a consequence

for turning away from God, our world was no longer 'perfect'. Death became possible because we were separated from God, our sustainer.

We became aware of the option to be Lord of our own lives, our attempt to live separate from God. But this causes pain and suffering when we do things without the guidance and support of our creator.

But God loves us and wants to be close to us (that's why He created us in the first place), so He gave us chance after chance to choose him and his ways. We kept messing up. So, he gave us laws to follow (Moses), to help us see that we can't do life without him – it's too hard. By measuring ourselves against the '10 commandments', we fail.

But he also gave us ways that we could be made right and restore our relationship with him. Long before Jesus, all we had to do, was to show how important God was in our lives and how sorry we were, by sacrificing our best lamb as worship to him. That lamb made things 'right' because it had taken our 'death'.

So after thousands of years of sacrifices, with people being not much better at living without God, Jesus came. Jesus is the visible image of the Father God (God with skin on). He was perfect, just like the lambs, and his intention was to be the sacrifice for all of mankind.

While he was here though, he showed us how to live in relationship with the Father. He showed us that it is possible to have complete peace and joy and to see God's power at work. He healed the sick, made the blind see, made the lamb walk and showed God's love (unconditional love) to everyone he met. He was revolutionary. His life is documented in many places as well as proof that he met all the prophesies that had been given by God hundreds of years before. He claimed to be the Son of God. He told people that if they saw him, that they had seen God. The religious leaders didn't like what he was doing. They were losing their power. They liked the rules and control, but Jesus talked about love being more important. So they plotted to kill him. But this is what Jesus intended. By Jesus dying, he was taking away the barrier that stopped mankind from being in relationship with God the Father. He was taking our death, just like the lambs used to do. There would be no more need to make sacrifices of innocent animals. Jesus did it because He loved us. So instead of us facing death for eternity, we have the chance of grasping hold of that eternity now - living with our creator and allowing him to be Lord of our lives. We don't have to get it right all the time, we can let God take control and he'll sort things out better than we ever could. But the best bit about Easter, is that Jesus rose from the dead. This is proof that death belongs to the enemy and has no power over us.

If we accept what Jesus has done, and choose to live in relationship with Him, death has no power. We can live in the Kingdom of Heaven on earth. So, we celebrate Easter – because Jesus dying on the cross took away our mistakes, our failures, our guilt and shame. And because Jesus rising from the dead, shows that God is so much more powerful than death, that there is hope for us – death is not the end. We can live with His love and guidance in freedom forever.

The bare cross is turned into a cross of flowers symbolising the joy of Easter, when we remember that, although Jesus died on the cross, he rose from the dead, and that we need not fear death - we leave this life and are welcomed into another place we call heaven.

BETRAYAL

As Jesus and his disciples moved around Jerusalem in the febrile atmosphere of Passover celebrations under enemy occupation, Judas lost faith in what they were doing. Jesus had made sure they were either surrounded by lots of supporters... or well hidden. The disciples were afraid that the death squad might descend on them at any moment. Each was giving utmost attention to their safety. None wanted to be the one whose casual conversation gave opening for the soldiers to move. One had given up. He'd had enough. So he brought the soldiers to a quiet place, out of public view, where they could arrest him and bundle him off before any of the rest of Jerusalem's public were any the wiser.

Judas didn't realise the significance of what he was doing, or how the consequences would eat away at him. Just hours later... seeing Jesus paraded like an animal, he threw down the money he had received and took his own life. Guilt, shame and regret.

The resurrection of Jesus teaches us that nothing is so dark that there is no way out. Guilt is swallowed up in the love and forgiveness of Jesus. Betrayal has shocking consequences... often taking us by surprise... but the one who was betrayed took our shame on the cross so that we might know the joy of forgiveness and the freedom of life with the Risen One.

I was struck, in the middle of March, by the young people who assembled across the world to protest about global warming and its consequences. Their voice tells us that the actions of one generation are a betrayal of the next. The placards waved by young people call their parents to bow their heads in shame. Their character and actions gives one a real sense of pride and hope. These are the ones who will soon be leaders in church and state.

Maybe too, they will lead a generation which takes things a little more seriously than their parents did! Being serious isn't a bad thing. The opposite of "serious" isn't "happy" or "joyful". The opposite of "serious" is "careless" or "casual". Maybe it's a sign that people's hearts will start being more open to recognising the reality of God's love and our deep deep need for his forgiveness.

As we celebrate Easter at the end of this month. We celebrate a living God who fills us with joy and forgives every sin we set before him. Completely. Unreservedly. Seriously! Mike Partridge

Saint Dunstans was a well known charity and it was a pleasure to welcome Blind Veterans U.K which the title under which it now operates to talk to us on the 18th March. Di Blackman, one of our helpers, is a director of the charity and arranged to have a presentation. John who was diagnosed with an eye condition in 1999 now has only 2% vision. He has been working for B.V U.K. for 7years and was there with Johnny his guide dog, a beautiful black Labrador. Anneka who is the representative for the South West and South Wales introduced the Charity. Originally only the war blinded qualified but now the rules have changed and any ex-Service men and women can benefit . The average age of beneficiaries is 87 and support is given to over 5,000 across the U.K.

It all started at the time of the first world war when Arthur Rearson returning from the war went round a ward giving Braille watches to servicemen - life can be very hard when you lose the sense of time. Of course new technology has taken over from Braille. Help is provided in many ways. Lifetime support is given tailored to individual needs: holidays, social activities, emotional support, respite care, and special equipment. John told us how he loved to read and a special reading light has made this possible. Spectacles which makes you experience what his condition is like were handed around for us to try, a frightening experience. If you think that you know someone who may benefit from help please get in touch.

Christine who is in control of the financial affairs of the club, reported on a successful year. We are grateful toher for her work. It is sadness we heard of the death of Pam Voysey. Our thoughts and sympathy go to her family.
