

Climate and Ecological Emergency. The Parish Council called an extraordinary meeting, on Zoom, for Wednesday 27 January 2021 devoted to the Climate and Ecological Emergency. The focus of the special meeting was to discuss and provide feedback on the interim draft Devon Carbon Plan, and the draft of an Ide Carbon Plan. Copies of these plans are now available on the Parish Council website

National Census in England and Wales, 21 March, 2021.

Questionnaires for the 2021 Census, conducted every ten years, will be available electronically for the first time. Completed forms are expected to be returned predominantly online. But it will also be possible to send in a paper census form. The government has produced a booklet (copies are in Ide Shop) to assist people without a connection to gain assistance in completing this census; and explaining how communities might reach out to them.

The booklet, Reaching Key Population Groups, A Community Handbook is also available at:- https://census.gov.uk/downloadable-resources/

The Children's Play Area, by Ide Primary School, is still open under the current Covid-19 restrictions. There's hand sanitizer in a dispenser on the fence inside; and clear guidelines are displayed outside and inside the play area, and on www.ldevillage.org.uk The main rule to remember is that numbers in the Play Area are restricted to a maximum of two family groups at a time, with only one adult per family group.

Doctors Walk and Balls Farm Road. We have had positive feedback from residents, commuters to work and school, pedestrians, families, people seeking space and exercise in Covid, and cyclists about the reductions in traffic along Balls Farm Road and Doctors' Walk. The Emergency Active Travel traffic restrictions, in place at the western end of Doctors' Walk, are by law a temporary measure, lasting until February 2022 when they will be reviewed.

Ide Parish Council supports the measure and will be writing to Devon County Council Highways, with results of recent surveys of usage by vehicles, pedestrians, cyclists and others to request that the restrictions stay in place. The feedback Devon CC receives, from members of the public as well as the Council, will help them decide whether to make the traffic measures permanent. Village residents' participation and engagement at Parish Council meetings

Council meetings are held in public, by law. This upholds a cherished democratic principle that residents and members of the public should be able watch proceedings; assure themselves that meetings are being conducted properly; and observe councillors debating and making decisions on the community's behalf. Like all elected bodies, from Parliament down to Parish, our meetings remain meetings of the Council: they are not public meetings.

From time to time we hold public meetings to address or consult on particularly important or controversial matters. The last ones we held were in February 2020, about the Weir Meadow and Northern Fields project. Public meetings are not constrained by the rules of Council meetings; nor do they carry the same statutory duties or powers. But the Council will always take heed of the views expressed at a public meeting when deciding what to do next.

At our Council meetings, we set aside ten minutes (more if necessary) for residents to speak or ask questions at the start of proceedings, and this applies just the same during lockdown while we are meeting on Zoom. Anyone who lives in Ide is welcome to give their views (known as a "representation"), or question members of the Parish Council, on items on the agenda for that meeting. You can also request that an issue be raised for consideration at a future meeting. You can choose to raise your point when we get to the agenda item that interests you, rather than raise it at the very start of proceedings. The Council will hear all representations before it starts to discuss and make decisions on the item as a Council.

How can I attend a Parish Council meeting as a resident during lockdown?

Covid-19 restrictions mean that we continue to meet remotely, in public, using Zoom. You can speak at or attend a meeting as a member of the public by first installing Zoom on your computing device. Then please contact Mel Liversage, the parish clerk, at least 24 hours before the meeting by email or phone (see details at end of this article). We will add you to the Zoom guest list, and send you the login details.

Pynes Community Orchard and Weir Meadow & Northern Fields

We have seen some false dawns in trying to nail the three year option to purchase agreements for both these projects to secure green, open, recreational space for the village. Every detail of the conditions required by the Church Commissioners on permitted uses, access, boundaries, water supply, overages were we to sell or develop the land in the future, mineral rights, VAT, vacant possession and exercising our option once we have the funds - have now been agreed; and we await the documentation. We do, at last, feel able to hold our breath.

Please remember that the Orchard, the Meadow and the Fields remain for now the property of the Church Commissioners, let privately to tenants. They are not yet accessible to the public.

Website. Ben Ervine has received the go ahead from the Council to develop the village website to become more vibrant and integrated, by creating a main Ide Village hub site, with a series of linked microsites serving, for example, the Community Shop, Memorial Hall, Ide Times, Churches, Pynes Orchard, Weir Meadow, as well as the existing Parish Council website itself.

Climate Emergency update - Ide carbon plan

74% of District, County, Unitary & Metropolitan Councils have now declared Climate Emergencies. This is a genuine commitment to work towards a specific measurable target. For most councils an early step is to write a Carbon Plan, setting out what actions we can take to make our communities sustainable. Devon has produced the interim Devon Carbon plan, and is running a consultation on it. With a great deal of help and many suggestions from across the community, we also have a draft Ide Carbon Plan and we would like to know if you can help make it better.

Ide Parish council will be looking at both plans on 27th January at 7:30pm. The meeting is on zoom and in public, you can come and listen, and there will be chances to speak, or you can give us feedback by emailing ide-carbon-plan@stygian.org.uk. Suggestions are welcome.

Teignbridge District Council to Support Electoral Form

In November I submitted a motion asking Teignbridge District Council to support the move away from first past the post, towards ranked choice and proportional voting, and to lower the voting age to 16 in local elections. I am suggesting that England should use the same system as Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

It came to Teignbridge Full Council on Thursday 14 Jan, to a healthy debate, with many councillors revealing their true colours, and a nail biting finish. It was interesting how many councillors spoke against fairer voting saying it would give them less power. A few councillors were quite dismissive of 16 year olds, but there were heart-warming speeches from erstwhile opponents who have been persuaded by this process.


Surprisingly several councillors trotted out the old myth that "All Politicians break their promises" which is ironic because bringing this motion is something I promised to do in leaflets before I was elected.

In the end it was approved 24 votes to 18, so the Council now officially supports reform, and will write to the Government and local Members of Parliament calling for changes.

Ide SHOP

IDE COMMUNITY SHOP AND POST OFFICE



Goodness – what a year 2020 turned out to be! January & February started off slow and steady then it all went pear-shaped in March. Lockdown brought problems with our older volunteers, who were told by the government to stay at home. We were fortunate to have offers of help from lots of you who were unable to go to work, and then the Ide Angels stepped in to help with home deliveries.

We struggled to keep up with the panic buying – mainly because our suppliers couldn't get hold of basics such as flour, yeast, tinned tomatoes and pasta. There was a shortage of McVities biscuits, but this was due to problems with cardboard boxes!

Several of the new volunteers asked what we do with the profits, especially as our takings were sky high.

I realised that there are a lot of new people in the village who don't know the history of the Community Shop so thought it would be useful to explain. Back in 2008, after Chris & Kathy Strong announced that their shop and Post Office (in the High Street) would be closing, the Parish Council, chaired by Colin Chapman, called a meeting to find out whether there was any interest in setting up a Community Shop. A lot of people were keen, although no-one had any retail experience – well I grew up in a village shop but that was before VAT had been invented.



A committee was set up and with grants from Ide Parish Council and Teignbridge District Council, we purchased a Portacabin through Ebay, and it was sited across several parking spaces in the village car park. Volunteers kitted it out,

stock was purchased, a rota was set up and it opened on 1st April 2009, (yes April Fools' Day) the day after the village shop closed. Judi Spiers and Ken Voisey cut the ribbon for our grand opening.

We had to wait another six months for the Post Office to be installed, with Colin as our first Postmaster.

Takings were good, most people were happy to have a shop & Post Office in the village, so we set about raising funds for a permanent site. We were lucky that the business next to the Memorial Hall was moving to new premises and we set about raising funds to buy the building.

We managed to get a grant of £50,000 from the National Lottery, and various other grants. But the bulk of the money came from a Village Share Scheme, with local people very generously investing a total of £68,370, with no offer of a dividend or even whether they would get any money back.





The property was in a very poor state of repair, so it meant knocking it down and starting from scratch. As soon as the builders had finished, volunteers stepped in to build shelving units, paint walls, and do whatever was needed to get it ready to open for trade. The committee argued over where to put the till, but I think we made the right decision. In trying to cut costs we nearly went without the canopy over the forecourt – thank goodness we insisted – no-one thought we would ever need to have customers queuing outside the shop!

The shop as you know it opened on 4th February 2013 – this time we had quite a celebration - with Fred Ames, Eve Jennings and Joyce Stevens doing the honours. And we had the Morris

dancers to entertain us.

So – after we have paid for the stock, Post Office wages, and other overheads, what happens to our profits?

Every year we allocate £1,000 to a Community Fund – for the benefit of Community groups who can request grants. In the past we have issued grants to Friends of Ide School, the Youth Club, Ide Allotments Association, Ide Times,



the Memorial Hall and many others. Last year the funds went towards expenses involved with the Community Orchard and Weir Meadow projects.

We are currently providing funding to the School to purchase laptops for home schooling.

Our main aim is to pay back our investors and we are making good progress. From the original investment of £68,000, over £40,000 has been repaid, leaving us with £27,470 outstanding.

By supporting the shop, you are supporting YOUR community.

Thank you to all our customers, shareholders, and most importantly, our volunteers. Without you there would be no shop!

We are extremely fortunate to have our Post Office open six days a week. We are grateful to Susanna, our Post Mistress, and Zetta who were particularly busy in the run up to Christmas.



The process to be referred for Foodbank assistance, can mean that families have to wait and have nothing to eat... Maia initially was buying the food herself, but when she realised how big the need was, she created a GoFundMe page and spends the

money in local supermarkets to pack her emergency food bags.



Rewilding Ide School (grounds not children!)

Two years ago school asked for requests for help in clearing the school grounds. A group of volunteers (parents, neighbours and governors) responded and helped to clear areas of the school, changing large unused or potentially unsafe areas into places where the children can play or use safely. This has been invaluable over the past year, encouraging the children to be outside more.

There is now a large outdoor play area with music station and large planters for the children to grow plants or vegetables in alongside the pre-school building.

When clearing and tidying the overgrown hedges, we discovered that the school field fence had a few large holes in it and in places the weight of the trees and hedges had actually pulled it down. We talked to the neighbours about the need to replace the fence and how we could do this to enhance the environment and provide more habitats for wildlife. The fence was erected with hedgehog gaps.. Native hedgerow shrubs and trees were planted on the school side of the new fence. We will be adding our numbers planted to the count in the Countryfile 'Plant a Tree' campaign. In the future we are plant or sow more shrubs and wildflowers in these In addition, bird boxes have been cleaned out and repaired, hedgehog houses have been made by a child (& grandparent), more hedgehogs gaps have been created and bulbs and shrubs have been planted in the outdoor learning areas and the front garden. The children helped to create a log pile, a bug hotel, a wildlife bath and bird feeders. Our work last year was recognised by the Devon Wildlife Trust who awarded us a Wildlife Garden Award. The award certificate is displayed on the shed in the outdoor learning area.

The school is part of the RHS school gardening campaign. Hopefully, we will be able to plant the sunflower seed that were sent to the school just prior to lockdown 1.0. We would like to join the RHS's Ide in Bloom project suggested on the previous page.



This year we have drawn up an **Environment Enrichment Proposal** planning out our strategy for improving the school site for children, staff, wildlife & climate (special thanks to Kate Morley, parent and Longdown Wildlife Warden for her input). Included are ideas such as:

Creating a sensory garden, wildflower meadow areas and managing these. Providing bat boxes and slow worm habitats.

CLIMATE and ENVIRONMENT EMERGENCY

The mound at the top of the school field on to the playpark has been left to rewild, We are hoping to involve the children in growing & planting wildflower plugs within this area to help start it. Wildflower seeds were planted last spring, a few did grow, which looked



amazing unfortunately very few were in school to enjoy them!

The Woodland Trust has a scheme to apply for hedgerow saplings and trees. We applied for some hedgerow saplings which arrived in November and were planted in the front garden of school. These will provide privacy and should help to reduce pollution from the road. We have applied for another allocation of saplings which has been successful this should be arriving in March. We would have loved to invite the community to come and help to plant these but Covid restrictions don't allow.

The school has a green team of children who work with Mrs Brown to look at all areas of climate and environment change.

We hope that in doing all these small things for and with the children in school they will engage and be inspired to take some of these ideas home to parents carers and grandparents, If this results in even just one change or action to help the environment or reduce our contribution to climate change, it will be something we can be proud of. We love the idea that the school is helping Ide to lead the way in fighting climate change.

Thank you so much to all the volunteers that have given time, skills and money to improve the school grounds for all. We are so massively grateful and proud of what has been achieved so far. Fingers crossed, soon we can continue with all our exciting plans.
