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

Vacancy for a Parish Councillor.

The Council currently has eight members; the full complement is nine. Here is an opportunity to work for your village community and improve the quality of life in Ide. Parish Councils are the most local tier of Local Government. In Ide, we receive just over £6,000 a year from Teignbridge District Council (the next tier up) to do our work.

We administer eight allotments for residents. We look after the cemetery, the war memorial, benches and planters, the children's play area, the car park, the bus shelter, flood trash screen, dog waste bins, Coronation Gardens and notice board, the container with sand bag supply, a strimmer, the defibrillator and two football goals on The Green. We work on capital projects to improve the environment, appearance and amenities within the village. We run the village website. We organise the maintenance, repairs and improvements to parish facilities including recreational areas, public spaces and cemetery. We liaise with Devon County, Teignbridge District and Exeter City on the maintenance, repair and improvement of highways, drainage, footpaths, cycle ways, public transport, street cleaning, conservation matters including trees and listed buildings, and environmental issues. We work closely with Ide School on road safety, the children's Play Area, community use of the MUGA, and access to the garden allotments. We operate on a small budget and many of the services we provide are funded by grants and other external sources. We provide an annual parish fund of £500 per year to which community groups can apply.

We run a Planning Committee, plus five additional parish council working groups: Climate and Environment; Emergency Planning; Weir Meadow & Northern Fields; Pynes Victorian Orchard; and the new Joint Projects Fund Raising Group.

Being a parish councillor is unpaid. You would be required to attend six bimonthly meetings a year; and in time take an active part in the tasks and projects the Council runs. Training will be provided. If you would like to be considered, please contact Mel Liversage or Nick Bradley in writing or by email. 21/00080/HOU 65 High Street, Ide. Demolition and rebuilding of an outbuilding, reconstruction of a greenhouse and alterations to the front and rear fenestrations of the main house. The committee voted unanimously to support this application. **Awaiting decision**

21/00981/TPO Maple House Old Ide Lane, Ide Reduce four limbs of one London Plane by up to 5-6m to clear buildings and height reduce by 4-5m Application refused

The chair reported that work in the Round Field, Crabb Lane has been suspended, by order of the Local Planning Authority (TDC), who have invited the land owner concerned to submit a relevant planning application.

The last meeting of the Planning Committee was on 24 June 2021; the next will be on 21 July 2021 at 6pm in Ide Memorial Hall.

CONSULTATION ON POSSIBLE HOUSING SITES

The Teignbridge local plan is being reviewed at the moment. Part 2 of the plan sets out the possible sites that might be earmarked for development in future, and consultation is open until midday on **Monday 9 August**.

Central government imposes housing numbers on district councils. And insists that our local plan complies with national policy. Teignbridge must show that it has a land supply for 751 houses per year or central government may take over control of planning as happened recently in South Oxfordshire.

Including a site in the consultation does not mean it will be built on. It does mean that the land owner has indicated they are interested in development, and Teignbridge District Council has not ruled it out. There are more sites in the consultation than are needed to meet the target imposed by the government.

I am sure there will be lots of comments on social media, but **please also direct** your comments to the consultation directly. I think it is important that local people can be heard on planning, and the consultation is our chance. This can really influence how our community develops for years to come.

Churchyard Update



With all the rain we had in May, the uncut vegetation in the Churchyard has put on a big growth spurt. While grasses dominate, there are a few other plants that have come to fore. In particular, there are lots of the yellow flowers of Cat's-ear among the gravestones. The flowers, which look like small dandelions, are a great source of nectar for bees and other pollinators. Besides the Cat's-ear there is also a

large amount of Ribwort Plantain, Hedge Bedstraw, and, dotted about, the lilacblue flowers of germander speedwell. The main grass cut is due towards the end of July / mid-August, depending on the weather and the timetable of the contractors who undertake the management on behalf of Teignbridge District Council. Following this cut selected areas may be further mown and scarified and a wildflower mix sown to increase flower diversity for the following yearr Richard Cottle (Ide Wildlife Warden)

A Community Orchard for Ide



In the last seventy years Devon has lost about 90% of its traditional orchards. Every Devon farm had its own orchard, with historical taxation figures showing that in 1789 there were 22 farms of varying size in the parish of Ide. Today there are six, and as the number of farms has declined, so has the number of orchards.

An aerial snapshot of Ide in the spring of 1800 would have revealed a tiny island floating in a sea of pink and white blossom. There are remnants of this sea: a strip of land behind The College; a paddock behind the Huntsman Inn; solitary, gnarled fruit trees in back gardens around the village; and, largest of all, the Victorian Orchard.

Originally part of Canns Farm, this orchard, despite its name, predates the Victorian era by several hundred years and could have been first planted in medieval times. The fact that it still lies within its original boundaries adds to its historical importance.

The Victorian Orchard lies across the road from Pynes Farm, on the right as you go south up the hill towards Dunchideock. It remains one of Ide's oldest traditional fruit orchards, neglected for two generations, yet still in its original form. Its 3.65 acres of sloping field, facing north, overlook the village. It contains a number of old apple trees, many fallen and dead. The Church Commissioners own Victorian Orchard and, stimulated by discussions about the Ide Neighbourhood Plan(2018) which formally designated the Orchard as Local Green Space, have agreed to sell it to the Parish Council for use as a community orchard.

There are over fifty community orchards in Devon. They have become popular as places for friends and neighbours to come together for seasonal events such as apple pressing or hay making; and they provide unique spaces for recreation, productive activity, and relaxation. Local, common, public space is something we are very short of in Ide. Community orchards are a fine resource for schools seeking outside classroom activities. They offer the chance to maintain and increase biodiversity, provide local fruit and to resist property development.

A traditional orchard is different from a tightly planted, modern orchard: less intensively managed, and more in common with woodland, pasture and parkland. It typically consists of fruit trees and grasses, with scrub round the edges and hedgerow. This mix of habitats adds up overall to something more valuable than the sum of its individual parts.

In November 2017 the Parish Council set up a Community Orchard Working Group to conduct negotiations with the Church Commissioners; plan a fund raising campaign; gather ideas for the use of the orchard which fit the needs of Ide's residents; and review how best to manage the orchard, its trees and boundaries.

The Orchard has been neglected for many years. Until recently there were 40 productive apple trees; there are now twelve. The remaining trees are interesting old varieties, so our first task in December 2018 was to carry out remedial pruning and care. In January 2020 we planted 68 new apple and four new pear trees, whilst also creating areas for other recreational activities in the longer term.

Old trees will be left as dead or decaying wood, where they don't affect the orchard's health, as a habitat for beetles, hoverfly and moths. The grass will be managed by grazing combined with infrequent cutting for hay. Clumps of bramble will be left wild. We will only trim hedgerows every three years. Uncollected apples will be allowed to lie for birds. Winter migrants such as fieldfares, redwings and hawfinches feed on apple pips and, with the grass allowed to flourish, the number of voles, and the owls that feed on them, will increase.

An ambitious strategy to raise the money to buy the orchard, along with Ide's other major project, Weir Meadow Recreation Ground, is being led by the Parish Council through its joint Projects Fund Raising Group - details of which are

regularly reported on the Parish Council's pages in the Ide Times, and on its own website. As we hopefully move out of Covid restrictions through the summer further details on fund raising and working in the orchard, and how individuals and groups can contribute, help or volunteer, will be announced.

Weir Meadow Recreation Ground and the Northern Fields

Public open space, parkland, a recreation ground: such assets are rare in a rural community. Ide is a tightly packed village, in a managed agricultural landscape. Vehicles crowd its streets. The village green, small and bounded on two sides by road, is the only open space for people to gather.

So when the opportunity came to acquire a flat, six acre field on the edge of the village, for the village, the Parish Council determined to do just that: to provide open space for relaxation, recreation and sport, publically owned, for public use, for the first time in Ide's history. In 2017 the owners, the Church Commissioners, accepted our offer to buy Weir Meadow. In 2018 the proposal to create a recreation ground on it passed into planning law in the Ide Neighbourhood Plan. In 2020 we secured planning permission for change of use from agriculture to a recreation ground.

Because we were always going to need time to raise the money, the Commissioners agreed to enter into an Option to Purchase Agreement with us, securing our right to buy within three years of signing, at an agreed price, under agreed conditions. Negotiations over the option agreement took longer than expected, because the Commissioners wished to retain the right of agricultural access across the Meadow to the Northern Fields for their tenant farmer.

We pursued several possible solutions. We considered sharing the entrance to the meadow with the agricultural contractors' machinery, and building a fenced off perimeter track round one or other margin of the meadow for the vehicles. But we judged it too dangerous for the public, too disruptive to recreational events, insufficiently controllable, and repeatedly damaging to the ground at the entrance. We looked at re-opening the old access entrance to Northern Fields on College Lane. But it proved unacceptable to the Commissioners. We also examined the feasibility of building a bridge across the brook from Triangular Field to the north eastern corner of the Meadow. But, whilst this was acceptable to the Commissioners, it proved prohibitively expensive when put out for quotation; and still did not give us unfettered occupation and control of the site in perpetuity.

The answer suddenly became clear. Owning the Northern Fields themselves would allow us to protect an additional section of land on the edge of the village from development; ensure it was used in an ecologically positive way; and provide public access with a new footpath, at the same time as solving the problem of agricultural access across Weir Meadow. Access to the fields down College Lane poses no problem for the size of vehicle needed to farm these fields sustainably. The Commissioners agreed to sell. In October 2019 we agreed a price, and the two fields are now part of the project, along with Triangular Field.

We held two public meetings in February 2020 which confirmed the community's support for our plans.

In March 2021 we signed an option agreement with the Commissioners, allowing us three years to raise the funds, certain that the purchase is ours to make at any point during that period.

Parish Councils are in a great position to take on projects like this. Government and county councils encourage parishes to own and manage land. Parishes are permanent, statutory, elected bodies, with formal systems of scrutiny. They can raise funds and borrow at preferential rates, for up to fifty years, from the Public Works Loan Board; and reclaim VAT.

We are also fortunate, for the Church Commissioners have honoured our long term vision for the community. They backed us over the last four years by sticking with negotiations for an option agreement that both of us could accept.

Phase I of the project, to secure an option to buy and obtain planning permission, is complete. Now in Phase II we have to raise £178,000 to buy the land. The option agreement extends for three years until March 2024, but the shelf life of planning permission chiefly constrains our time. By 16 October 2023 we must have bought the land, satisfied the pre-commencement planning conditions, and made a material start on development works. A Joint Projects Fund Raising Group has formed to drive and co-ordinate fund raising efforts for Weir Meadow and Ide's other major project, the Community Orchard; and you will no doubt be aware of events that are taking place as Covid restrictions ease.

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
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
