Green Space for Ide – Ide Community Orchard and Weir Meadow Playing Field with Northern Fields

The Option to Purchase agreements for these two sites have, at last, been signed and exchanged with the Church Commissioners. This allows fundraising to buy the orchard and the fields to begin. We have just under three years to complete the purchases of the land. The three working parties have produced a joint projects leaflet setting out all the information, along with the details on how you can help us to raise the money needed. This leaflet will be delivered to all households within Ide Parish by the middle of September 2021.

In October, we will hold an information event in the village hall, with the working group members available to answer questions, and the offer of a visit to the two sites to show residents what we plan. You will see from the above that the 360 village bus will no longer take you to the bus station in Exeter. The route now finishes in Sidwell Street. Unfortunately the new Exeter Bus Station is only for Stagecoach buses. All the unprofitable routes which are run by different bus companies are no longer permitted to use the Exeter Bus Station, as the new Bus Station is too small to accommodate them. Also the doors to such buses are in the wrong place. I understand a bus shelter may be provided in Sidwell Street! Our 360 Country Bus does stop at the top of Fore Street, Exeter, as well as in Queen Street and Longbrook Street (behind John Lewis).

Also, the new Exeter Bus Station is not large enough to accommodate the longdistance Express buses to Heathrow and elsewhere – they too will stop in Sidwell Street.

However, we are lucky to have a village bus and pensioners even travel for free. The bus stop and the ride on the bus are also great occasions to catch up on the local news and details of road closures. When Dunsord Hill was closed recently it was like going on a coach tour!

IDE COMMUNITY SHOP AND POST OFFICE



On the 24th September the shop will be taking part in the Macmillan World's Biggest Coffee Morning – in a slightly different way. You see the chefs on the telly when they do deconstructed desserts as a new slant on a dish. Well, we are

doing a deconstructed coffee morning. It has been tight at times, and we wonder if there is anyone else out there who would like to find out more about doing either a regular shift or being a life saver and stepping in when we have a gap. Both types of **volunteers will be welcomed with open arms**. Full training will be given and free coffee or tea whilst on duty. It is good fun and only 2 hours at a time and you can volunteer as little or as much as you feel able. Special mention and thanks must be given to David Williams who has the huge task of compiling the rota and making sure the gaps are filled – this is challenging and worrying at times, but he never fails – and so thank you David for all your hard work, dedication not to mention worry on this.

NEW HOUSING ESTATES IN THE IDE/SHILLINGFORD AREA

Thank you to all those who have joined the consultation on building sites for the Local Plan part 2, which has now closed. People need homes, and some of the sites will go forward but not all.

There is strong opposition from many people in Ide and Shillingford, to the development at Markham Farm. This is actually a Devon County Council owned farm and our group promised at the last election to protect the council owned farms ensuring they are not sold for building.

Councillor Alan Connett is pushing this at County level and my District colleague, Alison Foden, has started a petition adding further pressure on DCC to protect their farms.

There are more sites in the consultation than are needed to meet the numbers imposed by government.

IN THE DAYS OF 'SHANKS PONY'

(This was written for the Ide Times in 1989 by Frank Moore)

With today's traffic problems the sight of dozens of people walking three and four abreast through the streets of Ide would be enough to set one thinking of a mass suicide pact. Until about the mid 1930's any fine weekend would find whole families meandering through the village having walked from Exeter or Alphington.

All three public houses did a roaring trade and the beer gardens at the rear of each were usually full up. The wooden seats and tables occupied with dad enjoying a pint of beer or cider, mum her glass of port and lemon, and the kids a fizzy drink and a packet of crisps – refreshment before the steady stroll homewards.

Nearly everyone walked in those days. There was a weekday train service, but the first buses, operated by a firm named Milton, didn't commence running from Ide to Exeter until the early 1930's. Cars and motorcycles in the area were few and far between and not many even owned a bicycle. Most men and women walked to work, and children walked as far as three miles to and from the village school – no transport or school meals in those days.

We older boys and some of the girls, used to roam the countryside for miles around, walking through Perridge woods to Fordland pond, Bluebell Woods, Westown Quarry, along the banks of the rivers and streams. Nowhere seemed to hold any bounds of dangers for us. We seemed to know where every bird nested, including owls, kestrel and buzzard hawks, where all the largest trout swam, which corn fields were being harvested and were going to have the largest number of rabbits, which were either caught by dogs or hit over the head with sticks brandished by chasing children, as the rabbits bolted from out of the corn.

A popular pastime some of the older youngsters used to indulge in, on a Sunday afternoon when the trains were not running, was to walk along the railway track from Ide to Longdown Station. We were not allowed to do this but nevertheless we did. The track ran above Westown, through Perridge woods, and eventually passed through a tunnel three-quarters of a mile long, emerging just this side of Longdown Station. It was quite an eerie experience negotiating the tunnel. It was very damp and dark, and owing to a slight bend in it one would not see any light at the far end until quite a part of its length had been walked, and even then it was just a very faint glimmer. After a rest on the Station platform, we would return through the tunnel, walk a few hundred yards back along the railway track, crawl through the wire fence into Perridge Woods, descend, passing Fordland Pond, and join the road leading to Westown and home, with a healthy appetite for tea. We are indeed very fortunate living where we do that even in these days we can leave our homes and within minutes be in tranquil countryside. There are some wonderful lanes to explore around us, full of a wide variety of flora and fauna – much more exciting than watching it on television. Sadly, some of the places such as Perridge and Bluebell Woods, are now 'no-go' areas. The latter was all but totally felled and cleared but happily a lot has been replanted with young broad leaf trees and holds promise for future generations to enjoy.

Westown Quarry has been filled in, so no more kestrel and buzzard hawks will nest there again. The main thing that has all but vanished is the Teign Valley Railway. Traces of it are still showing, but only those of us who remember it can really appreciate what a really scenic route it traversed.

There are still several stretches of water available to explore and enjoy, but today's youngsters have other interests it seems. The skills of fishing for tiddlers, using a bent pin for a hook, a length of cotton, and a cork for a float, are probably unknown to them. Maybe just as well, as too much of our wildlife and marine life is daily being destroyed in all too many other ways. I only wish that in my school days my contemporaries and I had been taught more of how to appreciate, conserve and preserve the wonderful things around us.

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Warm Home Discount – money off your energy bill!

You might be able to get £140 off your energy bill this winter under the Warm Home Discount Scheme if you're either:

- in receipt of the guarantee credit part of Pension Credit, or
- on a low income

First check with your energy supplier to see if they offer the Warm Home Discount - not all suppliers are part of the scheme. Each energy supplier only accepts a limited number of applications and if you switch supplier before you get the payment, you have to apply again with your new supplier. The new supplier might have different rules about who gets the discount or it may have closed to new applications, so think about when you swap suppliers. This won't affect you if you're in receipt of the guarantee credit part of Pension Credit. Households on prepayment, smart or standard meters can all receive the Warm Home Discount. Find out more about the Warm Home Discount Scheme (including a list of suppliers who participate in this scheme) on www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme or contact your energy supplier - their contact details will be on your energy bill.
