IDE COMMUNITY ORCHARD

The formal opening of the Orchard took place on Sunday 5 June 2022, attended by over 100 people. One of Ide's oldest residents, Mrs Sylvia Moore, and one of Ide's youngest residents, Heidi Miles, joined in cutting the ribbon. Mark Thomas described how the orchard project had come into being, and Carolyn Tysoe read an extract written by Frank Moore about orchards in Ide. An apple tree was planted by the chair of the Parish Council. Many residents then picnicked in the Orchard at tables spread over the three and a half acres, on a warm, sunny afternoon. The community orchard is a wonderful green space for Ide, which we know will be used and enjoyed by residents for generations to

come.

WEIR MEADOW AND NORTHERN FIELDS

The Fete on 4 June attracted record numbers of people.... and dogs. And it didn't rain. Takings from the bar and the Pimms tent went to the Weir Meadow development fund, and came to over £2,200, for which the Parish Council extend very warm thanks to the organisers.

On 16 June we received the loan of £152,000 from the Public Works Loan Board for the balance required to buy Weir Meadow and the Northern Fields. The loan comes

at a fixed rate, over a 50 year period, and does not have to be secured against the land. Because the Parish Council is to be the owner, the government view the guarantee of the parish precept as sufficient security. You will see 'To Let' signs around Weir Meadow and the Northern Fields over the next four weeks. These relate only to the Northern Fields, not to Weir Meadow (they are positioned in places where they are most likely to be seen). Peter Skinner is kindly acting on the Council's behalf, pro bono, to gauge interest in renting the Northern Fields before we exercise the option to purchase agreement. All being well, we expect that by mid September we will be the owners of the Meadow and the Fields.

The Planning Committee voted unanimously to object to this retrospective application, on the grounds that it does not comply with the terms of the Ide Neighbourhood Plan. Policy IDE07 of the Plan requires that proposals for development within the Ide Gateway Enhancement Area, where Round Field lies, will only be supported if they do not have an adverse impact on the rural character of the Village entrance or its approaches along the C50 (Ide Village Road). The Planning Committee of Ide Parish Council consider that this development, whose operators have been running their business on the site for many months without planning permission, is in clear breach of the Neighbourhood Plan policy IDE07.

From your District Councillors

We are still working to get a policy in the next Teignbridge local plan requiring developers to use cut and fill where possible to accommodate surplus materials on site. This incentive would reduce the need for inert landfill sites which are damaging and unpopular with communities, and have had a huge impact locally. Developments which ignore this policy and export large quantities with Devon County expected to provide landfill sites, would be more likely to be refused.

A good example of this is the A382 Jetty Marsh link Road in Newton Abbot which Teignbridge recently agreed to partly fund. This is part of a wider strategy to improve the connection from Newton Abbot North to the A38 at Drum bridges. The upgraded link road has good walking and cycling provision helping to join the active travel Network from Newton Abbot towards Dartmoor. Built into this proposal is the use of inert fill material from the adjacent housing development to form the level of the new link road. Just the sort of thing we want to encourage with planning policies.

Also, by the time you read this we should have enjoyed the first shop AGM for several years at the Huntsman and we thank Colin and Dawn and their wonderful team for kindly hosting us and all their hard work in feeding and watering us during the evening. We hope many of you joined us and heard the latest shop news but most importantly just enjoyed a good night with us.

We are delighted to have welcomed two new volunteers to the shop team – Susan and Simon who have both grasped what needs to be done willingly and competently and we love having two new volunteers on board who it is great to work with. Thank you both for the shifts you have already done and what you are already contributing to shop life. We so appreciate each and every one of our volunteers involved in so many varied areas of shop life and we literally could not function without you so thank you for all the time you give up supporting us. We love it when volunteers suggest things we have not thought of and very special thanks to Sarah Reardon on this one for going around recruiting for more shop volunteers at the fantastic Sausage and Cider Festival at the Huntsman and the wonderful day that was the church fete and jubilee celebration. Sarah, we appreciate that you think so much of the shop to give up your time at such fun times to do this and all you do to support the shop and us on so many levels alongside your regular shifts.

Rich Reardon, the other half of this dynamic duo is great too and we thank you Rich for all your hard, and at times challenging, work doing the shop rota whilst David and Janet had a much-deserved break in Ghana. You did a great job – thank you so much.



Just a quick reminder of the great local Dartmoor Gin that the shop stocks. As well as being locally produced, using locally botanicals, each sale goes to help a butterfly and bug charity. Details of this can be found on the leaflets on the shop patio table. Some of the bottles are so pretty they make great gifts or would make great lights when the gin has gone,



and we also have some lovely gift packs with miniatures in that make a really nice present.

Update on Shop Supplies

We have always used Booker for a lot of the shop supplies that we cannot obtain from local suppliers and collected what products we needed on a weekly basis. Tesco bought out Booker a while back and instigated some changes. One of the changes being that we could not longer collect from Booker at Sowton and instead had to collect from Makro at Marsh Barton which in itself was not a problem. However, then they decided to stop a lot of the Happy Shopper lines especially the £1 lines which were popular lines in the shop. Instead they were stocking the same lines under their own branding of 'Jacks for Tesco'. We have sourced alternative lines, from different supplies, to avoid using these Jack labelled products as much as possible but unfortunately a few lines we have had to carry. So if you see a 'Jacks for Tesco' line in the shop it has been bought through our wholesalers nothing to do with us sourcing lines from Tesco. If you need any more information on this please do not hesitate to ask us.

JUBILEE CLUB

On June 13th, in keeping with the Jubilee Celebrations our speaker, Tina Young spoke of Royal Flower Traditions through the Years. We were in for a treat, Tina is an entertaining speaker, she retrained as a florist, horticulture being in her family, her Great Grandfather was head Gardener at the Torquay Palace Hotel, and she went to work at the Deer Park Country House where the flowers are grown on site.

Floriography, is the language of flowers, and the royal family have long made use of this language. Henry Tudor adopted the rose to commemorate the War of the Roses in 1455 -1485.

We learned that Myrtle, a symbol of beauty and love has been used in Royal bouquets since 1858 when it was used by Queen Victoria's daughter.



Our Queen Elizabeth favours the lily of the valley, which likes to grow in a moist shady spot but can be known to sulk if too wet.

Prince Charles likes delphiniums a lovely Hardy perennial which can easily be propagated by taking basal cuttings.

The Duchess of Cornwall is fond of Alchemilla mollis commonly known as ladies mantle. Tina told us that it was traditionally believed to restore virginity!



Princess Anne favours the Hellebores and the Duchess of Cambridge likes green and white colours.

There were various suggestions of alternatives to the use of floral foam possibly that old favourite chicken wire top of the list. Tina brought a lovely bunch of flowers for us to raffle which was won by John Worthington, quite appropriate because as I write this I notice today June 20th is his birthday.



The Churchyard – A group called “Love your Burial Ground” visited Ide Churchyard on the 8th June. We were told that churchyards were the oldest uncultivated pieces of land in the country. Originally they were lozenge shaped (it was believed that the devil hid in corners). They often had just one memorial for those buried there – not individual stones. It was suggested that the grass around recent graves, where relations visited, should be kept neat and tidy but that other areas could be allowed to re-wild although very long coarse grass would inhibit the growth of wild flowers.

Update on St Ida's Churchyard Grassland Management



Last year saw a new grass cutting regime put in place for St Ida's churchyard. The aim of this is to increase wildflower diversity and the overall wildlife value of the churchyard. There was definitely a flourishing of some flowers last year, such as hawkweeds and cuckoo flower and an increase in butterfly numbers, but docks, cow parsley and competitive grass species dominated. One year on, and with the benefit of last years work, a few changes are being

made this year. The main change will be an earlier cut (late June/early July) to the main part of the churchyard. Grass growth during the late spring and summer of 2021 was rapid and strong resulting in a tall, lush sward that collapsed in the late summer wind and rain. This made the late summer cut and clearance difficult, so an earlier cut should help prevent this. Removing the cut grass will still be a challenge, but with support, will hopefully be undertaken. The paths and areas around the church will continue to be cut on a monthly basis during the spring-summer. The vegetation in the eastern side of the churchyard will be left, with a cut planned here for later in the summer, as it was last year, and as is traditional for wildlife-rich meadows. The focus here will be to decrease the overall vigour of the grasses and dominance of plants like dock and cow parsley to enable other less competitive plants to flourish. This may require some seeding and additional grass cutting in the autumn. Any help with grass clearance / raking is always welcome and call-outs will be made in the Wild Ide / Ide Village Facebook group.

WEST TOWN FARM NEWS



Sarah interviews Andy

Sarah: So Andy, what do you love about the land at West Town Farm?

Andy: The soil and land at the farm have been a passion of mine for many years. So much so, that in 1992 the land and animals became organic. This means it is inspected once a year by the Soil Association. It is also a means by which to protect the health of the soil for the future.

Sarah: What has just happened?

Andy: This year I have been lucky enough to buy the farm and secure it's future.

Sarah: Hmm I thought you were already the owner?

Andy: No, I have been a tenant of the Church of England since 1983. My father was a tenant before that and Grandad before him.

Sarah: What does this mean for you?

Andy: I guess it has been a dream to be able to do this since the landlord first approached me in 2015 about the possibility of buying the farm. I have only been lucky enough to be able to do this because of friends, my brother and advice and encouragement from many of you.

Also the staff and volunteers at the farm have been so patient and supportive in the last year. It has been a mission. But after a gigantic effort it now means the future of the farm is secure. It's organic status can be protected, it can be kept together as one farm and provide access to all the people and groups that want to use it.

Sarah: What does organic mean?

Andy: It means that the soil, plants & permanent pastures at the farm are protected from pesticides and other chemicals. Biodiversity is one of the key missions at the farm, meaning a greater range of wild plants and animals are allowed to thrive. The cattle, who help preserve our species rich meadows, are treated with kindness and respect.

Sarah: What does the purchase of the farm mean for the people of Ide?

Andy: We are passionate about continuing to provide the highest quality fully traceable local organic beef to our neighbours and local restaurants and other retail outlets. We also hope the people of Ide will continue to enjoy open access to the countryside and woods on the farm trail.

Organic Arts will carry on the wonderful work they do with the people who need their services.

Sarah: Anything new in the pipeline? I notice you have new Bell Tents on the campsite
