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

COMMUNITY ORCHARD

Hedges and overgrown brambles were cut back before Christmas. People have made good use of the bumper apple crop in late autumn, with a lot of fruit left for the migrating birds. Field fares came early and have stayed longer to feed off the fallen crop. There was still fruit to pick from some of the mature trees in late December.

Volunteer days have been held on the first Sunday of each month, focussing on planting daffodils and crocuses. Fifty kg of naturalising bulbs went in along the transverse path and by the tables in the top corner. Work is ongoing to remove fallen trees from the hedges and tidy up decaying timber. The young trees planted in 2020 will be professionally pruned in February. We will need to replace four which have died. Some forty trees are now sponsored.

A winter Wassail will be held in the Orchard on Sunday February 5th at 5pm. We are inviting everyone to come and wake up the trees by making a lot of noise, bringing along lights, musical instruments, joining in or contributing to traditional wassail singing, processing around the orchard, and bringing cider and apple juice to enjoy or share.

WEIR MEADOW and NORTHERN FIELDS

A stile and a kissing gate have been installed at the two points of entry into Northern Field East, off College Lane. Two new dog waste bins - one at the entrance to Weir Meadow, the other at the upstream end of College Lane ford - have also been installed. The rusted dog waste bin by the cemetery will soon be removed from use.

In early January, the brambles in **Oak Bank** (the steep scrubby part of Northern Field West) were flailed, specifically sparing 40 oak saplings which we will protect with guards against rabbits and deer. A new opening has been cut in the hedge dividing the two Northern Fields, close to the junction with Weir Meadow, providing access along the southern margin of Northern Field West to Oak Bank. There are new signs, each with a map, at the entrances to each field.

A **National Lottery Community Fund** grant of £9,825 has been awarded, for fencing and tree planting, an interpretation board, bird and dormouse nest boxes, benches for Oak Bank and possible infill works at the Meadow entrance.

A **Woodland Trust** grant for a community tree pack has also been awarded, providing 420 mixed species saplings, guards and canes for planting in Weir Meadow along Fordland Brook, at the end of March. We will arrange a volunteer tree planting day - or two - to get these planted before Spring.

Football and Cricket Pitches. Devon Cricket Association has inspected the site, and advise that Ide would need to offer junior and women's programmes to qualify for funding from their association. Funding may be available from Sport England, the National Lottery or elsewhere.

Investigations are being undertaken to assess the **drainage works** required for a Weir Meadow football pitch. The Football Foundation, using its Grass Pitch Maintenance Fund, would consider funding drainage and levelling works in the Meadow if an affiliated team were to start playing matches there.

A volunteering WhatsApp Group has formed, led by Rachel Herbert, to undertake the various tasks needed.

Fundraising. On **Saturday July 8th** there will be a fundraising concert at West town Farm featuring Police Dog Hogan, organised by members of the Weir Meadow and Orchard Working Groups.

CONTROL OF DOGS

On 10 January at 4pm two dogs that were dangerously out of control and running off the lead attacked a 12 year old boy in Northern Field East, biting him on the leg. Very frightened, he was taken to hospital and missed some days at school. The person in charge of the dogs said they had seen the notice requiring dogs to be on the lead in that field, but had decided it was not necessary.

For the avoidance of doubt the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991 as amended in 2014 states that if any dog, whatever breed, is dangerously out of control in any place, including all private property, the owner, or person for the time being in charge of the dog, is guilty of a criminal offence. That offence becomes an aggravated offence if the dog injures any person or an assistance dog while out of control. A dog is regarded as dangerously out of control on any occasion on which there are grounds for reasonable apprehension that it will injure any person or assistance dog, whether or not it actually does so. The incident has been reported by the boy's parents to the police, who are currently investigating further; and to Ide Parish Council which owns the land.

The Council will not tolerate owners whose dogs are dangerously out of control on its land, posing a real or perceived threat to others.

TEIGNBRIDGE LOCAL PLAN

Teignbridge District Council published the latest version of the Local (ie District) Plan 2020-2040 in December. In their previous version, Markhams Farm was put forward as a potential site. It attracted strong objections, in particular from Ide Parish Council citing our own Neighbourhood Plan. The land is part of the County Farms Estate, and is very high quality agricultural land. Despite a petition with over 2,000 signatures to save the county farms, Markhams Farm has been selected for concept planning in the new version of the plan: 960 homes, with 20% affordable, called Markham Village; a green, a community building, a shop, allotments, a primary school, 12 hectares of open space, bus service. Vehicular access to the site will be from the Shillingford end of Markham Lane; and from Ide Village Road through a new access road emerging at Springwell Nursery. The full plan is on the village website or the Teignbridge DC website under Local Plan 2020-2040. Ide Parish Council will have discussed the plan on 25 January.

WAR MEMORIAL

The Council has earmarked funding to re-instate low post and chain fencing around the War Memorial to protect the surrounding grass, and the fabric itself, from damage by vehicles encroaching on the Memorial.

FROM YOUR DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLORS

The new Teignbridge local plan has been published. This is important and will shape development for the next 20 years. There have been consultations on policies and on sites put forward by landowners, site inspections to understand local factors, to help officers assess the merits and constraints of sites and write a plan with the best policies and choices to meet the required numbers.

The current plan is out of date and allocated sites are running out. TDC must provide 741 houses per year. Without an updated plan developers will soon be able to appeal refusals and build where they like.

Gove recently said housing numbers are 'advisory', but he has not changed the law. TDC cannot afford to wait but we don't want to lock-in these numbers, so we added a clause to review the plan if the law changes. The 741 houses include a 41% uplift over other areas, because Teignbridge prices are higher than salaries. This is supposed to bring down house prices, but it doesn't work. There are better ways to make housing more affordable.

The plan also specifies sites including Markhams and Attwells farms. We opposed these large sites with concerns about the roads and green space. We campaigned to save the county farms and we are disappointed better sites could not be found.

There are good policies in the plan including carbon neutral housing, sooner than national legislation. Specific policies encourage renewable energy. There is a chapter on climate change replacing a policy. There are improvements on environment and biodiversity and public green space. A new cut and fill policy encourages developers to minimise waste soils by accommodating on site. This will reduce the need for sites like Lower Hare and Lower Brenton.

The plan will soon start the final consultation until 13th March. The link to post feedback will appear on the TDC website. There is more information there and on our Kenn Valley Councillors website.

Local History at Ide

Extracts from the School Log for 1917, written we believe by William Jewell himself.

February 19th 1917

The master was absent this morning from 11 to 12 o clock in order to see his son off at St David's station

March 21st 1917

The master was called away last night by an urgent telegram from Birmingham Hospital summoning him to the bedside of his son Iack who is dangerously ill.

A later note the same day records

My dear boy Tack passed away this morning, RIP.

March 26th 1917

The master resumed duties this morning.

COMMUNITY ORCHARD NEWS




We will be waking up the fruit trees in the Community Orchard with our first ever **Wassail** on **Sunday February 5th at 5 pm**.

IDE TIMES PAST

It is sometimes said that "there is nothing new under the sun". In light of the recent chimney fire in the Hams and attacks by dogs, this saying would certainly seem to be borne out in this article by Francis Moore, a regular contributor to the Ide Times in the late 1980s through to the mid 1990s.

MEMORIES OF OLD IDE

Your correspondent, Bill Rowland, with his mention of Locks Cottages, which stood on the site of the school canteen, revived memories of the fire which caused their destruction. In 1933, I was a schoolboy at Ide Council School as it was then called. Playing cricket in the playground one hot summer's afternoon I remember hearing a Mrs Pope, one of the occupants of Lock's Cottages, screaming "the thatch is on fire!". Sure enough it was, and burning quite fiercely. We older boys, twelve to fourteen year old, under the direction of the deputy headmaster, Mr Shapland, formed human chains and managed to pass a lot of items of furniture from the cottages to the safety of the road. Sadly, by the time the fire engines arrived the cottages were almost gutted. The cause of the fire was a hot cinder, blown from the tall chimney of one of the several steam engines which ran regularly through the village, carrying stone from the then busy working Dunchideock quarry.



Another memorable steam engine of those days was the one with massive iron wheels which hauled the big threshing machine to the local farms. Ide High Street was more easily negotiated in those days.

I have followed the remarks of the residents of the College, regarding their battle with nuisance dogs, with some sympathy and also humour.

Up until a few years ago it was quite a regular thing for a photo to appear in the local paper, usually headed "Delightful rural scene at Ide", of a herd of some 20 to 30 cows making their slow headway through the College. This was a regular occurrence, twice a day, seven days a week, on their way to and from the fields, to be milked at the now extinct Drakes Farm. As to be expected, not all wanted to walk through the water, they preferred to use the pathway. There was no "Scoot", or "Scram", or "Pepper Dust" available then and naturally, after the progress of the cows, there is always quite a lot of mess. For any conscientious College resident this was the time for the hard broom and few well directed buckets of water to be brought into operation. Yes, in those days, the College not only had a "Rural Charm", but a rural smell as well!

Dog Walkers on the Farm - A Warning



Puppy with fixated leg caused by infection with Neospora

We ask that dog owners be extra careful to pick up poo while walking the farm trail this year. There is a disease, Neospora, which affects both cattle and dogs. Cattle can pick it up from dog faeces and dogs can pick it up from eating placental material.

We have no Neospora on the farm currently and we'd like to keep it that way. So vigilance around picking up poo is kindly requested. There is a risk that dogs could bring it onto the farm from elsewhere as the disease is on the rise in the UK. The disease causes abortion in cattle and muscle paralysis in dogs. Let's keep our animals safe. Many thanks for your consideration.

Tree Planting

On a snowy day in January we had a team tree planting morning. West Town Farm is part of the Higher Level Stewardship scheme which rewards farms for their contribution to positive environmental outcomes for biodiversity & nature. Tree planting has always been part of the plan and every year we add some to the farm, while also protecting our species rich grassland. This year we planted sweet chestnut in the small paddock which is at the start of the farm trail. This will eventually grow into a small woodland for all to enjoy.

New Apprentice & The Apricot Centre

We welcomed James to the farm at the beginning of the year, our new apprentice in Regenerative Agriculture Level 3. He will be here for a year and he has really settled in well. The scheme is run by the Apricot Centre near Totnes which recognises that there is a fundamental link between the wellbeing of the soil, food and habitat, and the mental and physical health of the people in and around the farm, making for a wonderful environment for a warm and effective mental health/wellbeing service for children and families. www.apricotcentre.co.uk
